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Letter from the CEO

Strong Roots. Healing Branches.

Dear Friends, Supporters, and Valued Partners,

Since opening our doors in 1998, the Community Medical Clinic of Kershaw County has been rooted in one powerful idea: healthcare is strongest when a community comes together.

What began as relationships planted like small seeds, neighbors helping neighbors, partners stepping forward, and volunteers offering their time has grown over 27 years into something strong and enduring. Today, those early seeds have become a mighty oak, sustained by deep roots of trust, generosity, and shared purpose.

The first word in our name is not accidental: Community. It reflects who we are and how we serve. Every patient, every supporter, and every partner is part of this living, growing network of care.

Because of you, our branches continue to reach further each year, serving individuals and families who might otherwise go without essential care. In 2025, we expanded into portions of Lancaster County, extending our mission while staying grounded in the values that have guided us from the beginning.

In response to growing economic pressures, we expanded our Federal Poverty Level eligibility from 200% to 250%, opening our doors wider to working individuals and families who often face impossible choices between healthcare and other basic needs.

- An individual earning up to \$39,900 qualifies for care
- A family of two earning up to \$54,100 qualifies
- A family of three earning up to \$68,300 qualifies
- A family of four earning up to \$82,500 qualifies

Our support also strengthened care for patients with chronic conditions. In 2025, we launched a new Cardiovascular Life Group and expanded our Diabetes Life Group, addressing two of the most prevalent health concerns in our community: hypertension and diabetes. These efforts reflect our commitment to prevention, education, and long-term health by supporting patients beyond the exam room and helping build healthier, more sustainable paths to wellness.

We recognize the challenges across today's healthcare landscape. Yet through it all, this community has remained steady—rooted in compassion and standing firm for those who need us most.

From seeds of compassion planted in 1998 to the strong oak that stands today, this work has always been rooted in community. As our reach now extends into portions of Lancaster County, we remain grounded in the same mission while continuing to nurture growth, extend healing branches, and improve health outcomes across our region.

About CMC

About the Community Medical Clinic of Kershaw County

At the Community Medical Clinic of Kershaw County (CMC) healthcare is more than treating illness, it is about caring for people, building a healthier community, and ensuring that every individual has access to compassionate, high-quality care, regardless of their circumstances.

Since opening our doors in 1998, CMC has provided free medical care to uninsured residents, ensuring that no one is left without access to essential health services. What began as a small, compassionate response to a critical need has grown into a trusted resource serving patients across Kershaw County and into portions of Lancaster County.

Every patient who walks through our doors has a story. A mother managing a chronic condition while caring for her family. A student who can stay in school because care is available on campus. A neighbor who, for the first time, has access to consistent, reliable healthcare. These are the moments that define our work.



Our approach is rooted in three core pillars:



Caring for the Whole Person

The **Community Medical Clinic** provides complete primary care for both acute and chronic conditions, including hypertension, diabetes, and COPD. Through our Camden clinic and satellite locations, we focus on prevention, early intervention, and education, helping patients take an active role in their health.

Through strong partnerships across our community, we provide comprehensive services, including cancer screenings, dental care, eye exams, vaccinations, and on-site mental health counseling — expanding access to essential care for those who need it most.

Our School-Based Health Center at North Central High School brings care directly to students, reducing the time they are out of the classroom and ensuring they receive prompt medical treatment in a safe, familiar environment. When students are healthy, they are able to learn, grow and succeed.



Connecting People to What They Need

Health is shaped by more than medical care. Through **Access Kershaw**, we connect patients and community members with vital resources, including specialty care, prescription assistance, transportation, food support, and financial assistance.

Our dedicated team—including case managers, nurses, social workers, and community health workers—walks alongside each individual, guiding them through the healthcare system and helping them overcome barriers that too often stand in the way of care. Because of this approach, fewer individuals depend on the Emergency Department for routine needs, and more are connected to the right care at the right time, improving outcomes and strengthening overall community health.



Improving Health Across the Community

The **LiveWell Kershaw Coalition** is a community-led initiative dedicated to fostering collaboration among residents of all ages across Kershaw County. Working in partnership with public and private organizations and local schools, the Coalition raises awareness of key community health issues and promotes strategies to improve overall well-being. Through LiveWell Kershaw, CMC extends its impact beyond individual patient care to address the broader conditions that influence health. By bringing together local organizations, healthcare providers, and community leaders, we are developing solutions that reach further, last longer, and create meaningful, lasting improvements in our community's health.



Early Detection. Lifelong Impact.

When Bonnie first noticed something wasn't right in December 2011, she didn't wait.

Small, painful lumps in her breast prompted her to seek care right away. A mammogram confirmed what no one wants to hear—breast cancer.

Just weeks later, in January 2012, she underwent a right breast mastectomy. But her journey didn't stop there. Genetic testing revealed she carried the BRCA2 mutation, significantly increasing her risk for future cancers. Armed with that knowledge, she made a series of proactive, deeply personal decisions to protect her health—choosing a preventive left breast mastectomy, as well as a total hysterectomy and oophorectomy.

With a family history of colon cancer, she has remained vigilant, staying up to date on regular screenings and preventive care.

Today, she continues to prioritize her health and is an active participant in the clinic's Best Chance program—committed not only to her own well-being, but to ongoing prevention and early detection.

A mother of three, Bonnie has built a legacy of strength and awareness for her family. Her story is a powerful reminder that early action, access to care, and informed decisions can change the course of a life.

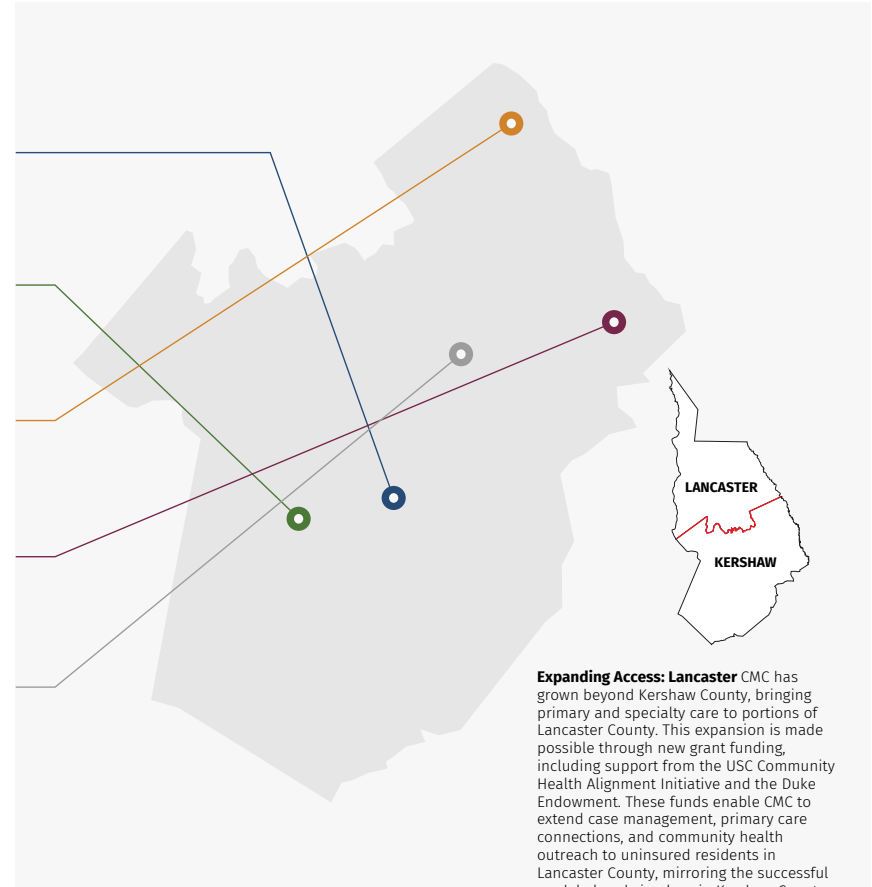

Expanding Access: Lancaster CMC has grown beyond Kershaw County, bringing primary and specialty care to portions of Lancaster County. This expansion is made possible through new grant funding, including support from the USC Community Health Alignment Initiative and the Duke Endowment. These funds enable CMC to extend case management, primary care connections, and community health outreach to uninsured residents in Lancaster County, mirroring the successful model already in place in Kershaw County.



Patient Story

Angela's Story - Healing the Whole Person

Patient name has been changed to protect privacy

Because lasting health requires more than treatment. It requires education, access, support, and care for every part of the patient's well-being.

Angela connected with the **Community Medical Clinic of Kershaw County** and **Access Kershaw** family in March 2026 as a *transitional care patient* following a life-threatening health crisis.

She had been admitted to the **ICU at MUSC Kershaw** with diabetic ketoacidosis (DKA), a serious complication of uncontrolled diabetes. While still hospitalized, our team stepped in. Sheri, our Access Kershaw nurse, met Angela at her bedside to begin immediate diabetic education, focusing on nutrition, medication management, and the steps needed to stabilize her condition and prevent future complications.

During her hospital stay, Angela required extensive treatment to bring her blood sugar under control. By discharge, she transitioned to oral medications. However, prolonged high blood sugar had already impacted her health, including decreased vision.

Through our partnership with **Servants for Sight**, Angela has been scheduled for a comprehensive diabetic eye exam, with additional care available if needed.

Living in Heath Springs, Angela now receives follow-up care at our **Mount Pisgah location**, making access significantly more convenient. With close follow-up with our nurse practitioner and continued support from Access Kershaw, she has made meaningful progress. Her blood sugar levels have improved dramatically and are now consistently in a much healthier range.

At the time of her hospitalization, Angela's A1C was greater than 13, a level that often requires long-term insulin use. Remarkably, she has improved her glucose control without requiring insulin, an outcome that is both rare and encouraging.

Angela has been invited to attend *monthly diabetes education classes*, where patients receive continued support, share experiences, and build connections with others facing similar challenges.

With the help of Access Kershaw, she has been connected to resources that help ensure her medications remain affordable and accessible, supporting her continued progress.

In addition to her physical health challenges, Angela experienced increased anxiety and depression following her ICU stay. Through our partnership with **Kershaw County Mental Health**, she now has access to counseling services to support her overall well-being.

Angela's journey reflects what is possible when care goes beyond a single diagnosis. By addressing the full picture of health — medical, emotional, and educational — she is not just recovering, but moving forward with the support and confidence needed for lasting, whole-person healing.



Patient Story

James's Story - Importance of Screenings

Because early detection saves lives—powered by strong partnerships that connect patients to care when it matters most.

When James connected with the **Community Medical Clinic of Kershaw County** in July 2024, it had been *seven years since he had last seen a doctor*.

As part of his initial visit, our team took a closer look at his health history and risk factors, including tobacco use. Through our partnership with **Atrium Health**, he was referred to the **Lung Bus**, a *mobile lung screening program*, and received a *low-dose CT scan within just 2 months of establishing care*.

That decision changed everything.

The scan revealed lung cancer with lymph node involvement. Because the cancer was caught through early screening, our team was able to act quickly. Within weeks, he was connected to **MUSC Pulmonology**, and his case was reviewed by **Atrium Health's nodule board** to guide next steps.

Through coordinated partnerships with MUSC and South Carolina Oncology Associates, James began treatment without delay. He completed both radiation and chemotherapy.

Today, his most recent scans show no evidence of disease.

This outcome was made possible by early detection, strong clinical partnerships, and coordinated care that moves quickly when it matters most.

WELLNESS & LIFEGROUP EDUCATION

Empowering Healthy Choices

CMC's wellness initiatives extend beyond clinical care, equipping patients and community members with the knowledge and tools to take charge of their health. Through workshops, group programs, and individualized coaching, we provide guidance on nutrition, physical activity, stress management, and chronic disease prevention.

Programs such as the Diabetes and Cardiovascular Life Groups offer structured support to help patients monitor blood pressure and blood glucose, make healthier lifestyle choices, and improve medication adherence. Community-wide initiatives and educational events reinforce these messages, promoting healthier habits and empowering individuals to prevent illness before it occurs.

By combining medical care with education and self-management support, CMC helps our community lead healthier, more active, and more informed lives.



COACHING AND LIFESTYLE EDUCATION

Personalized Support for Chronic Illness

CMC's one-on-one coaching has been transformative for patients managing chronic conditions. Our Coaching and Lifestyle programs provide personalized guidance, education, and ongoing support to help patients take control of their health and improve long-term outcomes.

Programs include:

- **Diabetes Life Group** – Teaching patients how to monitor blood glucose, manage medications, make dietary adjustments, and incorporate physical activity into daily life.
- **Cardiovascular Life Group** – Focusing on blood pressure management, heart-healthy habits, and lifestyle strategies to reduce cardiovascular risk.
- **Individual Health Coaching** – Personalized sessions with a diabetes community care coordinator, a trained nurse, or health coach to set goals, track progress, and overcome barriers to wellness.

Life-Saving Cancer Screenings

CMC continue to prioritize early detection by providing cancer screenings for:

- Breast & Cervical
- Skin Cancer
- Lung Cancer
- Colon Cancer
- Prostate Cancer

Cancer Screening & Prevention:

CMC provides free cancer screening programs that are critical for early detection and improved treatment outcomes. Through the Best Chance Network, funded by the South Carolina Department of Public Health, patients receive no-cost screenings for cervical and breast cancer, including clinical pelvic exams, clinical breast exams, Pap testing, HPV testing, and mammograms. The program also ensures appropriate follow-up care for patients requiring additional evaluation or treatment.

In partnership with Atrium Health, CMC hosts a mobile lung screening unit at our Camden location each quarter, serving approximately 20 patients per visit. This program provides low-dose CT screening for lung cancer detection. Any abnormal results are then reviewed by Levine Cancer Institute to offer further guidance.

Through the Colorectal Cancer Prevention Network (CCPN), patients have access to both annual FIT testing and screening colonoscopies. Each patient completes a screening process to determine the most appropriate option, with colonoscopies performed by participating gastroenterology specialists.

Prostate cancer screening is also available for male patients through both physical exams and PSA (prostate-specific antigen) blood testing. These services are provided using a shared decision-making approach between patients and providers to ensure informed, personalized care.

CMC has the ability to biopsy concerning skin findings in the office and refer our patients to Columbia Skin Clinic, where our patients are able to be seen at no charge through our partnership.

Additionally, in partnership with MUSC, patients may enroll in genetic health screening to better understand their risk for hereditary conditions, including Hereditary Breast and Ovarian Cancer (BRCA1 and BRCA2), Lynch Syndrome (hereditary colorectal cancer), and Familial Hypercholesterolemia (genetic high cholesterol).

Through these comprehensive screening and prevention efforts, CMC is helping detect disease earlier, expand access to life-saving care, and improve long-term health outcomes for our community.



School-Based Health



School-Based Health Center: Bringing Care to Students

The Community Medical Clinic, in partnership with North Central High School (NCHS), operates a School-Based Health Center (SBHC) on campus. All NCHS students are eligible to receive medical care at the SBHC, regardless of income or insurance status. There are no fees for students to be seen, evaluated, or treated by a medical provider. The SBHC complements students' primary care providers by bridging gaps in access to timely care, especially in this rural area of our county.

The SBHC functions like a "minute clinic" on campus, offering quick, high-quality medical care without students leaving school or parents missing work. For example, a student with an earache may be sent by the school nurse to the SBHC provider. The provider evaluates the student, diagnoses an ear infection, communicates with the parent, and sends a prescription to the parent's pharmacy. With parental consent, the student may also receive in-clinic medication to relieve symptoms and remain in class. This entire process typically takes 38-42 minutes, allowing the student to stay in school and the parent to continue working. The onsite nurse practitioner can test for COVID-19, influenza, strep throat, urinary tract infections, and check blood glucose levels. Over-the-counter medications can be administered with parental consent, and medical records can be shared with students' primary care providers to ensure continuity of care.

CMC has made enrollment easy through partnerships with Kershaw County School District, integrating SBHC registration into school enrollment, offering online forms, and providing paper forms on campus.

Since its inception in 2015, the SBHC has demonstrated measurable impact: student absenteeism has decreased, and graduation rates in the North Central area have increased. CMC is committed to the short- and long-term health and well-being of students, recognizing that a high school diploma is one of the strongest predictors of future health. Through the SBHC, CMC works alongside students, parents, and NCHS staff to ensure students are healthy, present, and positioned to succeed.

Access Kershaw



Healthcare extends beyond medical visits; it is about removing barriers to care and ensuring every person has access to the services and resources needed to thrive. Access Kershaw was created to do exactly that.

Founded in 2010, Access Kershaw was one of the first three Access Health networks in South Carolina—and remains the only network operating under a free medical clinic. What began as a small effort led by two nurses connecting uninsured and underinsured individuals to community resources has grown into a collaborative, multidisciplinary team.

Today, our team includes nurses, a social worker, and Community Health Workers who work alongside each client to develop a personalized plan of care—ensuring that no one is left behind. Access Kershaw proudly serves all neighbors, regardless of income guidelines. How we help:

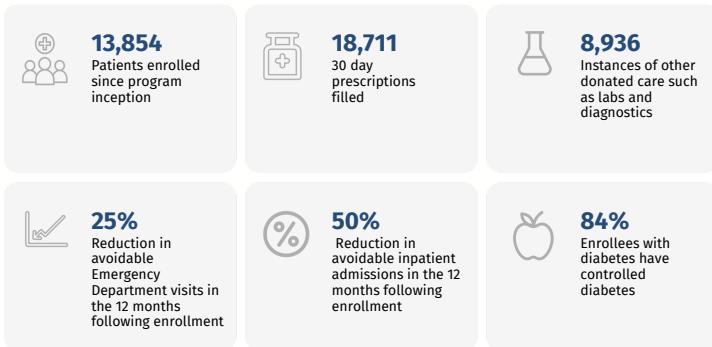
How We Help

Access Kershaw by the Numbers

Access Kershaw manages approximately 600 patients. To maximize impact, we prioritize case management services for higher risk patients with chronic conditions.



Access Kershaw provides access to primary and specialty care providers, care coordination and case management services to chronically ill, low-income individuals to improve health outcomes and reduce avoidable hospital utilization and costs.

It serves as a bridge between patients and the care they need working closely with the the Community Medical Clinic, specialty providers, hospitals, social service organization, and other nonprofit partners.

Event Highlights

CMC hosted three events in 2025 to raise both money and awareness of CMC's mission.



18th Annual Clinic Classic:

The Clinic Classic is a 1-mile and 5K race held each spring in late April, inviting participants to experience the beauty of Camden's historic district while promoting health, wellness, and community connection. The course winds through some of the City's most scenic streets, creating an engaging and welcoming environment for runners and walkers of all ages and abilities.

In 2025, the Clinic Classic reached a new milestone as the highest attended race in the event's history. The continued start and finish at LSUMC in Camden provided a central, accessible hub for participants and spectators alike.

This year also saw exciting growth in community involvement, including the addition of the Girls on the Run program and participation from the Legs of Steel Running Club, representing schools across the area. Their involvement brought added energy and inspiration to race day, highlighting the importance of youth engagement in health and fitness.

The Clinic Classic Challenge remained a key feature, encouraging school-wide participation throughout Kershaw County School District. Elementary and middle schools competed for a \$500 prize, with one winner selected from each level based on the highest participation percentage relative to school enrollment. This initiative continues to strengthen community ties while reinforcing the value of active lifestyles among students and families. Together, these elements made the 2025 Clinic Classic not only a record-breaking event but a powerful reflection of the community's commitment to health, connection, and collective impact.

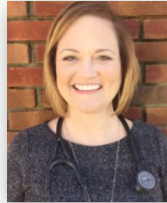
